Principal's Message

Last year was another outstanding year for Franklin Pierce High School. This was my first year as a Cardinal, and I am thrilled about the opportunity to continue to wear the red, black, and gold and work with this dedicated team of professionals to provide our students with an enriching and relevant education that will prepare them for success throughout their lives. In 2015-16, our graduation rate was 92.3%, which exceeds the state average by 15%. We were ranked #55 out of 477 Washington high schools by US News and World Report and received their Silver Award Designation. Our students exceeded the state averages on state assessments for English Language Arts, Algebra, Geometry, and Biology. Our 264 AP students took 397 national AP exams, and our students in dual credit courses earned 665 college credits before leaving high school. Our outstanding graduating class earned over two million dollars in scholarships. We had 71 honor graduates earning a 3.3 grade point average or higher. We had athletes participate in state-level competitions in football, girls basketball, track and field, wrestling, and girls tennis. Our boys wrestling team was also the 2A Academic State Champions.

While there is much to celebrate from last year, we know we still have work to do. Our goal is 100% graduation and success beyond high school. In order to accomplish this lofty goal, we must keep our sights focused on our three pillars for success: Academics, Behavior, and Attendance. Our professional development this year is dedicated to each of these three areas and we address them in our staff trainings and Professional Learning Community meetings. We continue to build upon our robust CTE courses (Career Technical Education) in order to provide students with real-world, hands-on experience in engineering, culinary arts, medical sciences, information technology, and video production. We are dedicated to this work and to providing our students with an education that will help them to discover, pursue, and achieve all of their aspirations beyond high school.






Test Results for 2015-2016

Beginning in the 2014-15 school year, the HSPE and the Math EOC (End of Course) exams were replaced with the SBA (Smarter Balanced Assessment). The SBA chart to the right represents the percent of students who were able to meet state common core academic standards in English Language Arts (ELA) and Mathematics (Algebra & Geometry). The SBA exams, required for graduation, are administered in the 11th grade.

The Biology End of Course (EOC) exam is administered at the end of the pertinent course, in any grade in which the course if taken. A chart reflecting Biology EOC test scores also appears to the right.

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Staff Information

Our highly trained and capable staff provide instruction, counseling, and support to all students. Our teaching staff meets Washington state assignment criteria as well as being assessed through the federal ESEA.

Classified staff provide many different support services such as instructional assistance, administrative support and nursing services.

All staff participate in ongoing professional development and in the implementation of our School Improvement Plan.

Emergency Procedures

FP students and staff routinely partcipate in various emergency drills, including earthquake drills, lockdown drills, and fire drills. Such drills allow students and staff to become familiar with the procedures and evacuation routes which would be used should an emergency occur. Our building safety team meets regularly to identify and address concerns, and our staff is always working to improve our campus safety and security.
